## **NASIC WALL OF HONOR**

**<u>Purpose and Description:</u>** The NASIC Wall of Honor recognizes <u>former</u> NASIC employees whose career service made a lasting positive contribution to the NASIC mission. NASIC Wall of Honor selectees are expected to evidence the following (used as headings):

- 1. Significant and lasting contribution(s) to the achievement of the Center's Vision and Mission. (20 point max score)
- 2. Exhibited outstanding leadership and/or mentorship in the performance of primary duties (10 point max score, consider dedication, professionalism, collaborative effort).

**Eligibility Criteria:** Any former civilian or military employee whose career with NASIC deserves recognition is eligible to be selected for placement on the Wall of Honor. A "former" employee is defined as any individual who separated or retired from US Government service before 1 Jul of the current award period. Normally, for the purposes of this award, a career would be at least 15 years of federal service, with at least **30** months spent at NASIC. Any individual previously selected as a Watson Award winner was automatically placed on the NASIC Wall of Honor upon their separation or retirement from US Government service. Any individual currently assigned to NASIC or any former employee of NASIC can nominate anyone else meeting the above criteria.

#### NASIC NEWS

The principal NASIC operational area of interest during the past several months has been a major reorganization. To keep it simple and best relate to our retirees, the changes do away with what was once the Global Threat Directorate, melding most of its resources back into the Space and Missiles Group. The other big move was to break-up the former Data Analysis operation into two groups. One is known encompasses the GEOINT (imagery and many former and current MASINT disciplines); the other is responsible for foreign materiel exploitation, SIGINT, open source, collection management, etc. Why so much reshaping over the last few years? Recall that the Center implemented a unitized structure several years ago. This militarized the organizational chart into groups, squadrons, flights, offices, etc. It also requires following a firm set of rules on manpower allocations and minimum numbers of personnel for groups. When changes in mission come along and perturbate the numbers, a reorganization may be the only answer that fits the Air Force structure.

The CFC was successful again this year and it may come as a shock that NASIC's annual goal sits at about \$200K. This is a little more than most of us were used to in past years. In addition, the annual Angel Tree project is also well underway. This effort to assist needy children in the W-P and Dayton area began as a FTD Officer's Wives project over 20 years ago and has grown annually until it has become the premier charitable Christmas event on base. It will likely serve 500 or more children this year with at least \$25 being spent to answer a "wish" garnered from the cards on the tree, each of which has been submitted by a local service organization and is picked off by a NASIC member. Alumni wishing to contribute can drop off a donation at the building. After all the packages are sorted and wrapped, they are distributed to the foster home organizations and charitable agencies that have been chosen as participants. Along with the distribution, a party is hosted for all the kids at each location.

Operationally, the uncertainty of the "fiscal cliff" looms for NASIC just as it does all of us. As you are probably aware, the DOD is tagged with a disproportionate percentage of the potential cuts which would come in addition to those already allocated to deficit reduction in coming years. While military personnel would be exempt, civilians are not and reductions or layoffs are a very real threat. In addition, mission operations would have to be reduced radically. Planning options have taken up much time and effort during the last few months. While we would all agree that fiscal austerity is appropriate, the way it is currently structured will not only have a huge negative economic impact, but will also leave the Nation's defense in a state of disarray. We will know soon if this is to be our fate.

Lastly, regarding mission emphasis, it is probably worth a reminder that scientific and technical intelligence remains the foundation of NASIC's production; however, the way it is presented and delivered has changed radically. Regarding delivery, it is simple enough to remind you of the electronic age. Seldom are the "doorstop" books produced. Annual repetitions of studies are gone and the customer base has changed to include operational forces to a much larger degree. Presentation is often dictated by what the user wants. The S&TI is packaged with the other intelligence elements that enable an answer to the "so what" question and frequently the producing elements are organized around a regional context. It is worth noting that as the active warfighting appears to be receding, the strategic challenges around the world appear to be on the upswing
