NASIC HIGHLIGHTS

Force Reductions – NASIC is not immune to all the issues you see in the press concerning declining DOD and Air Force budgets. These are hitting the accounts for military and civilian personnel. Selective Early Retirement Boards, Voluntary Early Separation Boards and Voluntary Separation Incentives are among the hot topics for the military. Comparable programs driven by incentives are being applied to reduce the cost of the civilian workforce. The complexities of these reduction programs are not for discussion here, but you can assume they will be with us for a while and will be impacting your friends and co-workers who are still on board. The first major exodus has just occurred and saw some 80 civilian employees leave. Their positions must remain unfilled for at least six months and if they are filled, it will likely be at a lower grade.

<u>Air Force Reorganization</u> – Driven significantly by the budget woes, the Air Force is about to announce a major reorganization. Commands will go and flag officers will go. The result will be a reduction of some 30,000 military personnel with 17,000 coming in the near term. Although details are yet to be revealed, it appears that this time NASIC will not escape. The most likely scenario is one that will see the parent AF ISR Agency in San Antonio become a numbered AF under Air Combat Command. Rather than moving NASIC, a nationally resourced organization, one level down in its new AF chain-of-command, one headed by a combatant command, it will become a Field Operating Agency (FOA) reporting directly to the Air Staff. There is considerable oversight being applied to the AF reorganization by Congress and the FOA option was a direct response to the Ohio House delegation's hold on the entire AF reorganization until they were assured NASIC was properly protected.

Future NASIC AA Proposal – Colonel Prupas encouraged us to take a good look at enhancing our Association sustainability by opening membership to the active workforce. The concept is simple. Those who choose to become members while still working will almost certainly become active retired alumni. While we will not go into options of details here, you will be provided with a concept of operations by the October annual business meeting. The Commander gained his perspective on this concept while commanding AFTAC where provision for the active force has proved to be a major contributor to the vitality of their organization for several years. More to come on this action.

Key Personnel Changes – Key Personnel Changes – Many of you are already aware, thanks to Bill Setchell's timely event reporting, that Colonel Aaron Prupas relinquished command to Colonel Leah Lauderback on 28 May. Colonel Prupas has been a staunch supporter on the NASIC AA during his two year assignment as the leader of some 3,000 personnel. As he heads for the Pentagon, Colonel Lauderback will arrive from San Antonio where she has commanded a Cyberspace Operations Group, in fact, the only worldwide offensive cyber operations organization in the Air Force. We can expect that she will have a pretty thorough understanding of personal communications methods! She will also have firsthand knowledge of NASIC's predecessor, FTD, and the Dayton area. Her Father, Wayne, will be familiar to many from his years as a foreign missile systems engineer in the 70s and early 80s before he departed to work for NRO in Washington. Colonel Lauderback's baptism was rapid as, due to the Chief's CORONA session at Wright-Patterson the first week of June, NASIC hosts the Secretary of the AF, the Chief, several 4-stars and a number of other senior AF leaders.

The NASIC Chief Scientist over the last eight years, Gary O'Connell, retired on 4 April; Curt Rowland is filling in while the replacement selection process begins. Another senior executive, Lee Fuell, has announced his plans to retire from the Space and Missiles Group on 27 June. In new senior executive actions, Steve Hayden is to be congratulated on his recent selection to fill the Global Exploitation Technical Director position vacated last year by our alumnus, Aurea Rivera.

NASIC Change of Command Ceremony

On 28 May, my wife Judy and I had the privilege of attending the NASIC Change of Command ceremony in which the current Commander, Colonel Aaron M Prupas transferred command of the National Air and Space Intelligence Center to Col Leah G Lauderback. This impressive ceremony was conducted in the National Museum of the Air Force at WPAFB, OH, and was followed by a reception at what many of us used to call the Officer's Club (now called the Wright-Patt Club). The Presiding Officer was Major General John N. T. Shanahan, Commander, Air Force Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance Agency (AFISRA), which is located at Lackland AFB, San Antonio, TX. Also in attendance were Col Lauderback's parents, Wayne and Gaye Lauderback; Col Lauderback's spouse Brenda and Brenda's son; Col Lauderback's sister Dawn and her family; a number of USAF, congressional, and local dignitaries; and an enormous contingent from the NASIC workforce.

On a personal note, Wayne and I had worked together back in the 70s and 80s at FTD, and it was so very good to see Wayne and Gaye and their family again. It was also great to see other old friends from those days at the Change of Command ceremony, to include Bob and Betty Kates, John Ganger, Warren Craig, and Wayne and Rosalyn Zwart.

Leah was only 12 years old when the Lauderback family moved from their home in Centerville OH to the DC area. I ran across her from time to time during my TDYs, (Ramstein AB when she was a 1st Lt and again at USPACOM (Camp Smith, Hawaii) when she was a LtCol). It was good to see her "back home" again, but who might have imagined that the little girl who left here in 1984 would return as the NASIC Commander.

Following the Change of Command ceremony 28 May, Col Lauderback emailed the following notice to the NASIC men and women:

This morning I was honored to take command of NASIC and I want to personally thank everyone who had a part in making this event successful. I would also like to thank everyone who has warmly welcomed Brenda and me during the transition to Wright-Patterson - we could not be more excited to be here!

As some may know, my father worked here at FTD many years ago and thus I grew up in Beavercreek and Centerville. Some of my fondest childhood memories include my parents' wonderful FTD friends, a few who were my soccer coaches, babysitters, or just great people with whom my parents socialized. Coming back to NASIC is both personally and professionally meaningful to me. Personally, I get a chance to visit with some of these lifelong friends in Dayton as well as my aunts, uncles and cousins who are scattered from Columbus to Kettering. Professionally I get to work with you - an amazing group of men and women who bring a capability to our core Air Force missions that exists no place else. - ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA:

-- Any former civilian or military employee whose career with NASIC deserves recognition is eligible to be selected for placement on the Wall of Honor.

-- A "former" employee is defined as any individual who separated or retired from US Government service before 1 Jul of the current award period.

-- Normally, for the purposes of this award, a career would be at least 15 years of federal service, with at least 30 months spent at NASIC.

-- Any individual previously selected as a Watson Award winner was automatically placed on the NASIC Wall of Honor upon their separation or retirement from US Government service.
